Ten years of Kids to school

The Kids to School foundation is ten years old now. A good opportunity for us to look back on what we have achieved so far.

Thirty-nine young people made use of the foundation and they were able to follow a study. The duration of the sponsorship varies from one to nine years. 19 of the students have graduated and we know that at least fifteen now have paid jobs. Unfortunately, two students had to leave the foundation prematurely, one because she received a sponsorship from an alternative organisation and the second because she chose to stop her education. A high school education costs between 550 and 600 euros a year. The costs for a vocational training are between 1,000 and 3,000 euros per year.

In the past year Ans has been in Tanzania and Kenva for a total of three months. She has clearly experienced the importance of having good contacts with people in the countries where we work. This is especially true for Kenya because we have the most students there and the students attend different schools and follow different courses. In Kenya we work with a Local Advisory Council (LAC). Five volunteers: Andrew, Nicholas, Alice, Carole, and Sr. Elizabeth assist us with advice but especially with action. They make the first contacts with the sponsored students who need help, they coach the students,, and they oversee a responsible financial policy in Kenya. In this newsletter you can see the members of the LAC in different photos.

In Kenya we work with three organizations, which help us and advise us.
Since 2012 we have been working with the Maasai Girls Education Funds (MGEF; www.maasaigirlseducationfund.org).
Since 2015 we work with Community Organization and Training for Risk Reduction (COTRR; www.cotrr-africa.org).
Since 2018 with Vijana Amani Pamoja. The name is Swahili and means: Youth Peace Together. (VAP; www.vijanaamanipamoja.org).

The contact with COTRR and VAP in particular is intensive because we work very directly with these organizations. They

are of great importance for introducing new students and coaching our students.

To ensure that Kids to School runs smoothly in Tanzania, we are in contact with The Baobab Home and the Steven Tito Academy. So far, we have only sponsored primary school children in Tanzania, but that will change in 2019, when we will also start to sponsor high school students.

In the Philippines we currently sponsor two university students. The program there runs smoothly thanks to the help of Sr. Gemma and the direct contact with the students.

We often hear that the special thing about Kids to School is that after high school we give the students a chance to follow a professional education. Another special feature is that we work with volunteers in the different countries.

News from our students

As stated earlier in this Newsletter, four students have graduated this year. Two students passed the final exam of high school and all the others started a new school year. We describe the new students here briefly. You can read information about all students on the website.

The new students

Kids to Schools has sponsored **Mercy Njeri** since July 2018. Andrew and Ans visited the family in November. Mercy lives in Muranga County. She is the oldest girl in a family with five children. Her father passed away a few years ago and her mother is now trying to support her family by selling second-hand clothes. It is impossible to pay high school for Mercy with her income.

In 2018 she obtained the Interior Design certificate; she is the captain of a women's football team at VAP and coaches a boys' team. Kids to School gives her the opportunity to get a Diploma in Interior design.

Message from two of our students
We are happy that two students are
contributing to our newsletter this year.
This time Morine Dwino and Irene
Saitoti wrote their stories.

Report of Morine:

Morine was in our program from 2012 to 2018, graduated this year and is now a nurse.

I remember the day very well. I had been waiting so long for it, and it finally came:

My first day in boarding school. All my problems were finally over. The daily walks to school in the morning and back in the evenings, sometimes in heavy rains, sometimes the rivers overflow to the extent that I could not cross, going to school without food at night, and the poorly lit lamps for reading at night. All this was over now.

All I had in mind now was to read, read and read. All thanks to a sponsorship that came in the village taking children from day schools to boarding schools. All my dad had to do was to pay a sum of 4000 Kes/- and the rest of the school fees was paid by them. This organization did not last long though and they pulled out having run out of funds because of sponsoring too many children. Here we were, back to square one. My

mom kept on coming to plead with the school repeatedly to let me study and then the fee was to be increased even though they knew very well that my family could not raise such an amount. Going to high school was such a struggle. My dad didn't have enough money to pay for my day schooling and I knew it already when I was in primary school. But I had one thing in mind, and that was to trust his words that he would do anything in his power to see me go to high school if I passed my final exams. When I passed my exams, he did everything, including talking to relatives and by God's grace my Aunt volunteered to pay for my school fees in a day school.

After several months, Sr.Theodora (bursar of the school) called me and the news she gave me was like a dream. There was an organization which wanted to sponsor five students who were hard working and whose parents were unable to pay for their fees. I was one of them. I was so happy and could go on singing and singing. God had sent a helper to me. The helper was the foundation KIDS TO SCHOOL. Sr. Mila came to the school to visit us. Also Ans visited our school in Raruowa. Each year we visited Nairobi to join the annual students' day of Kids to

School. During our first visit we met Ruud and Ans. I also met other students from other parts of the country who were in the same foundation.

My first mentor was Mr. Andrew and he struggled with me so much showing me the right way, we went through a lot together. Later on Mr. Nicholas became my mentor. I must say that he is a good listener and advised me on the right choices. He was there for me when I needed him the most. Everything was going on smoothly until my third year in High school when I lost my mom from cancer, may her soul rest in peace. It was so hard for me to cope with the loss of my mother.

The foundation supported me together with my teachers and family.

I sat for my final exams. Thereafter I did my computer packages with the support of the organization I was so lucky to be in this organization for they were ready to pay for my schooling not just in high school but also further studies which is so rare. When my results were out, I was a bit disappointed I expected higher grades. My dream always had been to become a medical doctor but for that my grades were too low.

I applied for Bachelor of Science in Agriculture in a local University but didn't succeed. Then one day Sr. Mila suggested that I pay her a visit and I got a chance to talk to Sr. Irene who advised me to start a nursing course in the same school she was studying at that moment. I joined Cicely McDonell School of nursing. I was so happy to join the school. It was a very good school with cool learning environment, good food, and everything that one would wish for and had great expectations. In the school there were a lot of challenges such as standing for a long time during practical's and there was a lot to cover in a short time. But with time, I was able to adjust. Ans and Jose visited me during my first year and even though I wasn't able to take them round the whole hospital, I felt great and blessed to have them. This was such a great motivation. I had a lot to share with Jose since she is also a nurse.

During my second year, the school increased the fees by 40% since we had new buildings with better study rooms and hostels. I informed Mr. Andrew, mv mentor at that moment and he informed the organization about the changes and my school fees was paid to completion. In my third year, I got sick from cholera and got admitted to the hospital. On discharge, the hospital bill had gone too high for my family to pay. Once again the foundation interceded on my behalf and there came a reduction in the bill. The foundation however was not planning to pay. Finally my family managed to raise 50.000 Kes and my classmates raised 78,000 Kes towards this. I can't fail to recognize the efforts of Mr Andrew and Mr. Nicholas during this time for they devoted their time to advocate on my behalf.

I sat for my nursing council exams and passed my exams. It felt so good to finish school and now I am a qualified nurse. During my graduation, Ans came and attended my graduation. This was such an honor and I am grateful that she created time to come. My father was so happy to meet her even though they had difficulty communicating to each other. He keeps telling me how sweet and kind she was. Thank you.

Here I am today, a grandaunt (graduate?) with diploma in nursing in the best school in the country. All this would have not been possible without Kids to School.

I am grateful for all the support from you and thank you also for shading light in my family. You have raised me to a point that I can take care of myself and saved me from early marriage and early pregnancy. Everyone in my village is proud of me and the confidence and joy in my father's face is beyond explanation.

Report of Irene:

Irene Saitoti was in our program from 2009 till 2017. She got her Bachelors in Business Management in 2018.

I found my second family in Kids to School. Taking up someone's responsibility by being a parent to a kid, you never gave birth to, is a rare thing in today's world!!! It started in 2009 when Kids to School started to pay for me to be able to go to high school. This came at a time when we were about to give up on my studies. My parents had a willing heart but no money to pay my education. But for me it was not easy to give up, I told them to wait for a longer time till it was really no longer possible. I believe in impossibilities. Every student with whom I finished class eight had already joined high school. God brought a helping hand through Sr. Jocelyn Pecto, one of the founders of Kids to School. I joined Rombo Girls Secondary school. I finished after four years, which was back in 2012. Kids to School was so good to me and gave me the possibility to go to university. In Sept 2013 I joined Kenya Methodist University and started to study for a diploma in Business Management. It took two years and I managed to finish it with credits in 2014. The Foundation was happy with my achievement. I am one of the few blessed. While waiting for the diploma, Kids to School pay my computer studies in June and Aug 2015.

Sept 2015 I received the most welcoming news that I could apply for a degree course. I enrolled for a degree in Business Administration (Finance Option) in Kenya Methodist University. As part of the study it is required for all students to do an internship for a period of three months. I did this in Sanlam insurance company working as a finance manager in credit managing. The company wrote me a recommendation letter. My degree course took two years; I was able to finish in Sept 2017. I graduated on Oct 13 2018 with a Second Class Honors upper division. Currently I am searching for a job to utilize

my study into a real life thing. My dad is a happy man since he knows well that I will help him and my siblings out of the difficulties they have been going through because I have all what is needed. All this because of the Foundation Kids to School.

Kids to School is my home and my family. Ans, as the president and a mother to us, is one of a kind. She is determined to see all of the kids happy after school and be able to become independent people. Every year at the annual students' day we meet motivated speakers who encourage us.

José, young and determined. You are one by whom I was motivated through your desire of helping young people while you are still young!! God bless you too!!! Thank you dear.

Members of the local advisory council you are not forgotten. You do so much for this organization God bless you all!!! Maasai Girls Education Fund, you made the journey smoother. Lucy and the organization I found a home there. May God continue blessing you.

For the kids or rather students: work harder, take the opportunity given to you as a ladder to take you to another level. Don't take it for granted. Do as it is advised by the mentors and leaders and your life in the organization will be smoother. All the best sisters and brothers.

We are not lucky but rather blessed to be given the chance for a bright future, God bless you so much and add you more years to see all of us becoming what we wanted to be.
